## DAY OF PILGRIMAGE

**Introduction:** What is a Day of Pilgrimage like at Marymount Hermitage? It is basically a day-long group retreat. Through photos taken by the pilgrims on April 22, 2023, I hope that these images tell as much or more than words to answer this question.



Arriving at Marymount Hermitage in Mesa, is the beginning of this pilgrimage. The chapel, amidst sky, desert, and mountain in spring grandeur, invites you to consider our Creator/Father.

The day begins at 9 AM in chapel for a short prayer and welcome talk. This is important for those who have never been here.





After the orientation talk, people walk over to the library.



Mercy House is the center for hospitality. The largest room is the library where classes are held morning and afternoon.

from Boise where he lives in the St. John Vianney Center for retired priests of the Diocese of Boise.




After Mass, at about 12:30 PM, we return to Mercy House for lunch and a social hour.

**NEW SIGNS:** The welcome door mats in front of chapel get a lot of use. I was looking for just the right kind and design for use there. By God's providence, I found the perfect one in Reilly's Church Supply &

Gift store in Boise. Jesus saying, "Abide in me,"



(Jn.15:9) is just what we need to hear in our hearts when we enter the presence of the Blessed Sacrament.



Major road work made Hermitage Lane so smooth that the tendency has been to drive too fast on it. My first concern was the safety of pedestrians. There are often neighbors or retreatants out walking, saying their rosary. My second concern was for the maintenance of the road. When the newly improved road starting quickly to develop washboards, I consulted a local road builder to ask him why this was happening. First of all, it takes about 5 years for the gravel to settle in and be more stable. So that was reassuring. He also was definite about the point that, if people drive too fast on it, it will develop washboards. So I asked him what speed he recommended, to which he replied, "15 MPH, max!" So this is the reason why Hermitage Lane now has four new speed signs: 3 coming in and 1 going out. The only trouble with this new rule is



that I will have to observe it! However, the good news is that, if I can do it, so can you!!! This is important information not only for neighbors and retreatants, but also delivery trucks. Now, the expectation will be clear to all. The signs were actually researched and purchased by Mike Nourse. It was his last gift to Marymount before he died. He had offered to install the signs, but I knew he could not. He was too sick already in May of 2022, so this work was done by our good neighbor from Mesa, Tim Moyer. **PRAYERS REQUESTED:** I ask prayers for some intentions and developments with regard to Marymount Hermitage. Our next non-profit Board meeting is June 6. We will have important details to discuss. We also pray for you, especially at daily Mass. Peace.
