

### **JOURNAL OF CHRISTMAS & NEW YEAR'S**

**December 21-25, 2023:** I was privileged to make a short pre-Christmas retreat staying in the diocesan guest house near the Cathedral of St. John's in Boise.

I took as my main spiritual reading Jesus of Nazareth:
The Infancy Narratives by Pope Benedict XVI. It was rich and moving for prayer and meditation and to date, I am still using it for inspiration. I was able to walk to daily Mass at the Cathedral and for the Christmas Eve and Christmas Morning Masses of Bishop Peter Christensen.

Christmas afternoon to visit my sister and her family. The special reason and joy was meeting, for the first time, my great niece, Evelyn Agnes, known as Evie, who is 2 years old. Unfortunately, by the afternoon of Dec. 26, I was coming down sick with something respiratory. We assumed at first it was only altitude sickness, but even with emergency supplemental oxygen, I was not getting better. Lucille decided to fly me home early to get me to a lower elevation, at the very least, to give me a better chance to recover. December 30, 2023-January 4, 2024: Generous and compassionate friends in Boise cared for me while I was too sick to drive home. A visit from 5-11 AM on Dec. 31 for urgent care at the ER at St. Al's Hospital in Boise confirmed a diagnosis of bacterial pneumonia and bronchitis. I did not have a fever, but I had no energy. My brain was not functioning very well either and it was hard to pray. To while away the long hours every day, I sat in front of their living room fireplace and read (re-read for the

nth time!) The Chronicles of Narnia by C. S. Lewis. I know the stories by heart, but it was just fun to go interiorly some place simple and happy, when I was suffering so much physically.

January 5, 2024: This day I felt well enough to drive as far as Payette; then Weiser friends met me there for her to drive me and my car to Marymount. They unpacked the car for me and, though I was exhausted, it felt so good to be home after such a long time away. A Mesa neighbor bought fresh groceries for me in Council and so I was settled into my own nest. Ahhhh.

January 6-10, 2024: There was no question of going out for Mass last weekend, but Father Jerry Funke, our pastor in Weiser, came to the Marymount chapel after the Sunday afternoon Mass in Council and gave me the Anointing of the Sick. The power of the sacrament is so great and peaceful! By Sunday, Jan. 7, I really felt I was beginning to be well again. Meanwhile, on Monday, Jan. 8, a Pacific storm is bringing heavy snow and high winds and continues as I write. I measured 7 inches of snow. The storm is set to last until Sunday, Jan. 14. I am not going anywhere, so I am

willing to wait to have the road plowed when the snow and high winds abate, perhaps by Monday. **January 11, 2024:** This week I have had enough strength and energy to get some light housework done and work in my office. This time of year, most of my responsibilities keep me in my office. I am working on year-end accounts and reports, which are submitted annually to the Bishop of Boise and the Board of Directors for the non-profit, which is Marymount Hermitage, Inc.

One important occupation is writing thank you notes for donations. This will take me weeks to complete because I can only hand-write a limited number of notes each day. Obviously, I have much for which to be grateful for generous and thoughtful friends and benefactors! Mass is offered for you once a month to ask the Lord's blessings on you and your loved ones.

I do feel sad every year when the Christmas season ends on the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. It is so short! I feel especially sad this year since I missed so much of the season, without Masses especially. I will do what I often do and that is privately celebrate Christmas until Feb. 2. I will play Christmas music while I write notes to friends and enjoy both!


